Forecasting Process: students learned of senior options during SSR on January 21 (the presentation can be found here), and returned course selections the week of Jan. 27. I was available at lunch January 22-24.

Some thoughts to consider and/or talk with your student about:

- o Does your requests match your interests & passions?
- Will your senior year schedule reflect growth & rigor?
- Are you interested in a special program (e.g., CNA, CEO, Cooperative Education, OJT, JALC Welding, Automotive, or ASL, or Teacher's Assistant)?
- o Do you feel good about the English sections you chose?
- o Is there balance in your schedule? Are you able to manage your time to be successful; eat and sleep; as well as enjoy the things you love (extra-curriculars, clubs, etc.)?
- Career-Bound Student: do your electives match your career plans? Now is a time to focus on your soft skills: attendance, work ethic (i.e., good grades), effective & thoughtful communication, professionalism, problem-solving, etc.
- Military-Bound Student: will your requests help you prepare for the ASVAB exam? Did you choose the right PE for you? Communicate with your recruiter.
- College-Bound Student: have you taken at least 3.0 credits of social studies? 3.0 or more of science? Did you add math senior year to round out 4.0 credits? Have you checked colleges-ofinterest for Admissions Requirements (core expectations as well as world language and fine arts)?
- All Juniors: at the end of senior year will you have completed all CCHS graduation requirements (e.g., 19 credits; Consumer Education; specific course requirements, etc.)?
